CSLAP - The Lake Moraine CSLAP (Citizens Statewide Lake Assessment Program), had a successful 2022 season. The test results will add another year of data to Lake Moraine's legacy of affiliation with the CSLAP Program. This data helps identify changes in water quality so that emerging problems can be detected and management practices to preserve the water quality can be implemented.

Thank you to all of our trained volunteers for everything they do to help with water collection and sample processing, from finding the sweet spot at the sample site to Secchi Disk readings, Kemmerer bottle manipulation to lake perception, HAB assessment, chlorophyll filtering and proper packaging of samples for shipping: Terry Spooner, Ann Palmiter, Janet Walsh, Alan Tuttle, Teena Spooner, Ava Walsh and Tim Peach.

I'd like to give a special thank you to Earl Ewing who retired from the CSLAP Program this past spring. Earl spent many years running the program on Lake Moraine and giving feedback of his and volunteer experiences to NYSFOLA for improvements to the program. Earl also spent many hours training me on the intricacies of the preparation and handling of water samples for shipment to The Freshwater Institute Laboratory for analysis. Thank you, Earl, for all you've done for the Lake Moraine CSLAP program!

The number of Harmful Algae Blooms for 2022 on Lake Moraine were fewer than for 2021, but they were still present. This year we had a new purple variety, reported by Al Lash, (thank you), in August. There have been a couple of sightings within the last two weeks of the streaky green variety that floats on

top of the water. Keep your eyes open for the possibility of more. We spotted some last year through November.

Aquatic Tax District – Here is a short review of the details of the Aquatic Tax District. Before the tax district, volunteers from the LMA would canvas the lake seeking a \$50 donation for the SAVE THE LAKE fund. Some of the old stickers can still be seen around the lake.

Because of the work of many LMA members led by Greg Reuter, the Town of Madison created a tax district of about 200 parcels of land basically bordering on Lake Moraine. They would collect \$9,000 from the new district with each parcel being assessed the same amount but not to exceed \$50 per parcel. There have been two increases, one to \$18,000 and to where it stands today at \$27,000 with no parcel to exceed \$150. The present assessment is \$131.17. (\$27,000 divided by 131.17 = \$205. Therefore, there are 205 parcels in the Aquatic Tax District.

It was also agreed upon that the Board of Directors for the Tax District would be the Board of Directors of the LMA. The funds could only be used for the benefit, health and well-being of Lake Moraine.

Boater Safety Courses - Who needs a New York Boating Safety Certificate

If you were born after January 1, 1988, you are required to obtain a Boating Safety Certificate to operate a motorized boat or PWC in 2023.

As of January 1, 2025, all operators of motorized boats or PWCs in New York are required to be certified.
